
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BIG BROTHERS BIG SISTERS CELEBRATES OUR HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

Overall, 98% of all high school seniors in Big Brothers Big Sisters' mentoring program graduated on time, and 70% enrolled in post-secondary education. Congratulations to all the graduates, their mentors, and their families on achieving this outstanding accomplishment!



OPPORTUNITIES GROW FOR BIG BROTHERS BIG SISTERS' mentor 2.0 STUDENTS

THINK BACK ON YOUR HIGH SCHOOL EXPERIENCE. FOR MANY OF US, THESE WERE YEARS OF EXCITEMENT. POISED ON THE THRESHOLD OF ADULTHOOD, WE LOOKED FORWARD TO A FUTURE OF UNLIMITED OPPORTUNITIES AS WE EXPLORED POSSIBLE CAREERS OR PLANNED TO CONTINUE OUR STUDIES.

When youth in Big Brothers Big Sisters' mentoring program begin high school, they may not see a future of possibilities. Many face financial, language and cultural barriers that make it hard for them to navigate the education system. Often these teens will become the first generation in their families to graduate from high school.

Mentor 2.0 is Big Brothers Big Sisters' curriculumbased, technology-enhanced high school

mentoring program. It combines the one-toone relationship model Big Brothers Big Sisters is known for—with a twist. Our mentor2.0 volunteers communicate with their mentees through a secure online platform. Big Brothers Big Sisters staff provide weekly curriculum-focused lessons in the classroom and facilitate monthly face-to-face meetings with each class, so mentors and students can work on lessons together.

Lessons are designed to help students explore all post-secondary options. Youth develop essential non-cognitive or "soft skills," such as critical thinking, perseverance, character, and utilizing a growth mindset. Volunteer mentors—all careerfocused, college educated, adults—encourage them with real-life examples and offer invaluable advice, support, guidance, and friendship.

To implement mentor2.0, Big Brothers Big Sisters partnered with Veritas High School on Milwaukee's south side. Mentors are matched with incoming freshmen. Relationships continue throughout high school and through students' first year of postsecondary education. This summer our first class of mentor2.0 students graduated from high school! As this program continues into its 5th year, for the first time in our 43 year history, Big Brothers Big Sisters will continue to provide professional support to any mentoring match who wants our guidance beyond high school.

Finally, children with a mentor develop social and emotional skills that eventually help them grow into strong, healthy adults. But the lifechanging impact of your gift doesn't end there.

Big Brothers Big Sisters' professional support staff changes the lives of each child's family. Whether providing children with backpacks stocked with school supplies, inviting moms and dads to enriching parent engagement events, or supporting the family with resources and referrals, Big Brothers Big Sisters staff members wrap their care around entire families.

Volunteer mentors report that becoming a Big Sister or a Big Brother changed their life for the better too. Mentors develop leadership skills, self-awareness, and cultural sensitivity as well as perspective. One volunteer said "mentoring allows me to see people outside of the community I live in, and not just from the youth perspective, but even other mentors are from all over the city. It's really allowed me to see the fabric of the community."


