

THE CHILDREN WE SERVE

The youth Big Brothers Big Sisters serves face many challenges in their lives.
Our programming removes barriers to long-term success for young people by matching them with caring volunteer adult mentors. Big Brothers Big Sisters staff intentionally identifies and enrolls youth facing adversity who will benefit from strong, long-term relationships with professionally supported mentors.

In 2022, Big Brothers Big Sisters served 1,074 youth.

OUR UNIQUE ONE-TO-ONE MENTORING PROGRAM

Big Brothers Big Sisters' one-to-one mentoring program is a proven, evidence-based intervention that makes a **life-changing impact** in the lives of youth, families, and volunteer mentors. Our mentoring program offers three one-to-one options. In each, volunteers engage with their mentee 2-4 times per month.



Community-based Mentoring: Youth engage with volunteer mentors throughout the community and spend time together doing activities they choose based on mutual interest.



School-based Mentoring: Students engage with volunteer mentors at one of 10 partner elementary or middle schools in Milwaukee and Waukesha counties for educationally-focused mentoring.



mentor2.0: Students are matched with mentors at Big Brothers Big Sisters' four partner high schools. Mentor2.0 combines inperson mentoring with safe, secure online communication and a comprehensive weekly curriculum focused on post-secondary and career readiness.

OUR VOLUNTEER MENTORS

Dedicated volunteer mentors have always been Big Brothers Big Sisters' most valuable resource. Our volunteers bring a wide range of backgrounds and life experiences to their mentoring relationships. They are college students, professionals, homemakers, and retirees. Big Brothers Big Sisters' mentors continue to be there for their mentees, and the youth we serve know their mentor is always in their corner. Someone who is a trusted friend. Someone to turn to when times are tough. Someone to encourage them to achieve their greatest potential.

MENTORYOU: SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM



The challenges of the past three years have had serious implications on children's social, emotional, and mental health. In fall of 2022, Big Brothers Big Sisters reinforced our focus on social and emotional development by implementing a new mentoring option called MentorYOU. This is a facilitated group mentoring program that serves elementary students from low-income families in Milwaukee. This program utilizes an evidence-based curriculum that focuses on five social emotional learning competencies: self-management, self-awareness, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making. Through MentorYOU, a Big Brothers Big Sisters Education Coordinator utilizes this curriculum to facilitate weekly classroom sessions.

MentorYOU promotes social and emotional growth and develops the following critical life skills that are important to a child's development and mental health:

- Self-confidence
- Understanding and managing emotions
- Controlling reactions
- Expressing feelings
- Recognizing strengths
- Self-efficacy
- Self-discipline

- Managing stress
- Communicating clearly
- Being aware of others' feelings
- Coping with challenges
- Developing problem-solving
- Resisting negative pressure
- Resolving conflicts

SCIENTIFIC EVALUATION

Big Brothers Big Sisters is committed to measurement, analysis, data-driven decision making, and continuous improvement. We evaluate programming using outcome evaluation tools created and developed by Big Brothers Big Sisters of America and leading youth development experts and researchers. We measure outcomes for every youth and every match relationship on an ongoing basis using the Outcomes Evaluation System, which has three components:

- The Youth Outcomes Survey is a scientifically proven evaluation tool that measures outcomes by pre-testing every youth who enters our program and post-testing them each year.
- The Strength of Relationship Survey measures the strength and quality of the bond between youth and mentors, allowing staff to offer resources and guidance to mentoring matches as needed.
- Professional Case Management by Big Brothers Big Sisters Match Support Specialists who contact each youth, parent or guardian, and mentor (monthly in the first year of a mentoring match and quarterly thereafter) to discuss progress towards achieving goals, address specific needs, provide coaching, and ensure child safety.

MEASURABLE OUTCOMES

Big Brothers Big Sisters' mentoring program provides youth with the resources, structure, and support they need to succeed in life. Youth in Big Brothers Big Sisters' program achieved the following measurable results in 2022:

78%

had a positive attitude towards school.

86%

maintained or improved their grades.

87%

of seniors graduated from high school on time.

68%

of graduates enrolled in post-secondary education.

PERSONAL BEHAVIOR

99%

avoided involvement in the juvenile justice system.

99%

avoided teen pregnancy.

98%

did not use alcohol, drugs, or tobacco.

HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS

92%

maintained or improved social acceptance and positive peer relationships.

84%

maintained or improved parental trust and their connectedness to their parent(s).

80%

indicated their mentor is someone they can count on who cares about what happens to them.
